The spring and summer are also a special time of year in the Hawaiian Islands as pupping season for endangered Hawaiian monk seals. Help protect our beloved Hawai'i state mammal by keeping a distance of at least 150 feet — about the length of a football field — from monk seal mothers and their pups. Pursuing and feeding endangered marine mammals such as the Hawaiian monk seal is prohibited by federal law. Do not attempt to touch, ride or feed monk seals or other marine mammals. Failure to comply with protections afforded to endangered species may result in fines.

They record sightings of whale sharks, manta rays, Hawaiian monk seals and even coral bleaching for regenerative tourism efforts. The project, which was launched with a traditional Hawaiian blessing on March 18, aims to ensure the protection and preservation of the palace's historical integrity and valuable contents.
