DISCOVER NATIVE HAWAIIN CULTURE

Royal Hawaiian Center

Royal Hawaiian Center (RHC) has partnered with the Institute for Native Pacific Education and Culture to host Kaulele Exhibits: The Science of Kapa, Kaulana Mahina and Loko I'a, now through March 29. The interactive Hawaiian culture and science exhibits offer attendees of all ages an opportunity to *kilo* (observe), *'imi loa* (explore), *noi'i* (investigate) and learn about *loko i'a* (Hawaiian fishponds), *kapa* (Hawaiian bark cloth) and *kaulana mahina* (the Hawaiian lunar calendar). MĀLAMA HAWAI'I: VOLUNTOURISM

Kanu Hawai'i

Residents and visitors across Hawai'i are encouraged to participate this April in Volunteer Month, a statewide initiative dedicated to fostering community engagement and service. Coordinated by Hawai'i-based environment-focused community organization Kanu Hawai'i, the Volunteer Month campaign aims to mobilize over 20,000 volunteers in more than 600 events spanning seven of Hawai'i's islands. Activities will include environmental cleanups, educational workshops, cultural preservation projects and multiple service opportunities designed to strengthen community bonds and promote a culture of giving. Mālama Maunalua is a community-based nonprofit organization committed to restoring the health of Oʻahu's Maunalua Bay through habitat restoration, science and planning, and education and outreach. It works extensively across the ecosystems of the Maunalua region to help restore Maunalua Bay's marine resources and enhance knowledge and environmental awareness in the community. From removing invasive algae, restoring reefs with thermally resistant corals, and outplanting native sea urchins as biocontrol to help mitigate the growth of invasive algae, to assessing runoff impacts in the region and educating students and

February, 2025 (through 2028)

Wahi Pana: O'ahu's Storied Places — Wahi Pana is a temporary public art project of the City and County of Honolulu Mayor's Office of Culture and the Arts (MOCA) and is a winner of the Bloomberg Philanthropies' Public Art Challenge grant. The project includes art installations that activate sites across O'ahu by connecting them to stories rooted in Native Hawaiian history and stories. Launching early 2025, this project brings together local artists and storytellers to create 11 multi-media installations around the island. Each installation will encourage residents and visitors to engage beyond the surface and to connect with the island's rich history and culture. March 7-9, 2025

Honolulu Festival — Celebrating its 29th anniversary, the Honolulu Festival is one of Hawai'i's premier cultural events. Hōkūle'a 50th Anniversary — The Polynesian Voyaging Society (PVS) invites the public to join a series of special events honoring the 50th birthday of Hōkūle'a, Hawai'i's iconic voyaging canoe.
