**King’s Runner 10K (O‘ahu)** — The King’s Runner 10K is a flat and fast course beginning and ending at Thomas Square in Honolulu. Originally a tune-up race for the Hapalua half marathon in April, also on O‘ahu — the event has grown into a mass participation 10K of its own. The race has no time limit and welcomes both runners and walkers. Start time is 6:45 a.m. and parking is available at the Neal S. Blaisdell Center parking lot across from Thomas Square. ◆ **April 1-30, 2025**

**Kanu Hawaii Volunteer Month (O‘ahu)** — Throughout April, residents and visitors across Hawai‘i are encouraged to participate in Volunteer Month, a statewide initiative dedicated to fostering community engagement and service.
